





The Virtue of Humility

God's word is seed. What an amazing harvest you can have in your life by receiving God's word! However, this depends on how we receive God's word. To make it phenomenal, we should receive the words with meekness as James said. The theme of his book in the Bible is how to have a living faith. What is that huge Catechism book all about?

I am sure a majority of us have this book in our homes stacked away on some shelf gathering dust. The size of the book itself is quite intimidating, let alone the contents. That was the case for me as well, until a few months back, when the Covid-19 pandemic hit, and life, as we knew it, came to a stand-still. With nowhere to go, which freed up my weekends, I decided to give this book another shot. Yes indeed, it took a pandemic to bond with the book called the **Catechism of the Catholic Church**!

Well, the long and short of it is that we all think...Catechism? Really?? Isn't this something we learnt in pre-communion classes and in Sunday School? So, what more is there to learn? But the reality is that we barely know 10%, or even less of what the teachings of the Catholic Church really are. The following sections will give you a little background on how and why this book called the **Catechism of the Catholic Church** was conceived and written. I will also write about my experience and perspective on how to read this book.

History of CCC:

It all began in 1962 when Pope John 23rd convened the Second Ecumenical Vatican Council. The first Vatican Council (VC) was held about a century ago, and therefore, the decision to hold a second VC was a bold, yet much needed step for the Catholic Church. The 2nd VC was called to update the presentation of faith and to spiritually strengthen the lives of all the faithful in the modern world. The Council met from 1962 through 1965 and, although Pope John 23rd died in the summer of 1963, the 2nd VC continued in full swing under the newly elected Pope Paul VI.

Thirty years after the 2nd VC ended, Pope John Paul II, brought to fruition, the proceedings of the Council in the form of a book called the **Catechism of the Catholic Church (CCC)**. Pope JP II, was a Cardinal during the 2nd VC, and actively participated and collaborated in the development of the Council. The Pope writes that the 2nd VC has always been his reference point for every pastoral action during his Pontificate years. In this spirit, in 1986, Pope JP II, after holding a Synod of Bishops, entrusted a commission of 12 Cardinals chaired by Cardinal Ratzinger (future Pope Benedict 16th), with the task of preparing a draft of the Catechism as requested by the Synod Fathers. An editorial committee of seven diocesan Bishops, experts on theology and catechesis, assisted in this commission. After six years of intense work done in a spirit of complete openness and fervent zeal, the **Catechism of the Catholic Church** was published in 1992.

Contents of the CCC:

The CCC contains four parts that are linked to each other: 1) the Christian mystery of Faith 2) Liturgical actions of Faith 3) Living the faith through life in Christ and 4) Basis of our faith through Christian Prayer, with "Our Father" being the epitome of our prayer life.

How to read the CCC (my perspective):

When I sat to read the CCC for the first time, I started to read, like most of us do, from the beginning – which generally would be the logical thing to do. However, halfway into Part 1, I was very overwhelmed by its contents and it was hard for me to process everything. I put the book away into a far corner of my library – out of sight, out of mind! But in the next few years, the desire to give this book another chance kept resurfacing, especially after hearing a homily, in which the priest talked about Part 4 of the CCC – Christian Prayer. That made me open the CCC again and I began to read the section about Christian Prayer. This, in my opinion, is a great place to begin reading the CCC. One particular segment that caught my eye, is something we all can relate to, called the "Battle of Prayer" (CCC 2725). This was an eye-opening section, as I read about the dryness and distractions we all feel in our prayer life. I would encourage everyone to read this part of the CCC, and from there, you can go backwards. The four parts of the CCC are related to each other, and there is no rule against reading the book backwards!
